FROM OUR NORTHERN CORRESPONDENT

Tournaments come north.

There have been over 300 CNSW tournaments in AC, GC and Ricochet since the last one was held in the north of the State. It has been far too long. But there will be four in the next few months, and entry numbers show what a thirst there is for tournaments in the north.

This year two tournaments will be held at Ballina, Lismore and Byron Bay. In 2018 and 2019 the NSW GC div 3 singles held in the south attracted 6 entries each year. In 2021, with over 3 months to go, already I have counted 27 players committed, without yet counting nearby clubs, Lismore and Casino.

For the doubles the figures for 2018 and 2019 were 8 and 9, so far there are 15 pairs committed.

Six lawns will be in use and three local councils will give their backing.

Why so many entries? Partly there is a longing in the north to play without the cost of getting to Sydney, but mainly because joint hosts Ballina and Ballina Cherry Street have been banging the publicity drum and blowing the publicity trumpet: loudly.

These figures are achieved even before potential competitors are vaccinated.

Club captains in the north are working hard to get their 9 and above GC handicappers into their first tournament.

Once these events are over we must hope Ballina people write up what they did for the rest of us to learn from their example.

CNSW Tournaments come north.

But, as they say in the TV advertisements: Wait! There is more.

The CNSW Ricochet Championships will be in Sawtell, Doubles 24th-25th June and Singles 26th-28th June. Already there are 17 registrations. With the tournament run by Jenny Arnold; any event she runs is a delight to attend, and with Richard Hughes, the new State Coordinator for Ricochet, nearby, this will be another well attended northern event.

Border Closures

While we all hope to be able to travel freely around Australia soon, Winter is coming and there is the likelihood that the odd case of Covid will see borders slammed shut for a few days at a time; snap lockdowns.

Queensland and WA are quickest to close the doors, but others will follow. Beware being caught the wrong side of the border at the wrong time.

The Tweed Heads/Gold Coast AC tournament in July attracted over 70 AC players in 2019, over 14 events and ten days. The numbers will be less in 2021, and the number of events reduced. Events will be in five locations, with some events in Coolangatta, Qld, and some in Tweed Heads, NSW, close to that much televised border. How do I ensure I can get to both events should Annastacia Palaszczuk close the border. I went looking for a large hotel with the front door in Queensland and the back door in NSW. I found it. Let the border close, I will be alright Annastacia.

Jinx or Genius?

What is it about Coutts Crossing that stirs up Urunga's Geoff Chapman. In the Beryl Chamber's qualifier in 2020, Coutts Crossing's Peter Martin would have got to Tempe if Geoff had not put in successive 9 and 14 point (peg out) turns off a 10 handicap: his best ever performance. Simon Cook drives all the way to Orange with high hopes for their Autumn Carnival, only to come up against Geoff, who inflicted Simon's only loss. Is he a jinx on Coutts Crossing?

Probably not. The reality is that Geoff, one of the most charming and generous people you could meet, is also a leader of the new batch of very good players emerging from the north of the state. At Urunga he benefits from the coaching of Barb and John Piggott, and has improved by leaps and bounds since three years ago, when he consistently lost to Coutts Crossing's players.



If you see that big smile and twinkling eyes approaching, don't be fooled, he intends to beat you. Watch out for this star of the future.

When may we visit?

It is a complaint heard frequently from grey croquet nomads, and from vacationing players. How do I find out whether I can play at your club?

Recently I planned to visit a city club to play. The club listed two phone numbers, both were unattended and asked me to leave a message. I did; they never called back. Another had its play days listed online, but they had changed. The day I turned up bright and early, the club was deserted. Numerous players have the same experience. So try a check on your current 'welcome'. Does your club answer the phone, do you make people aware of when they will be welcome to visit?

Losing a tied match

Here is a lesson I will not forget, and a mistake I will not repeat. I was in a tight AC match in Toowoomba in the delightful Darling Downs Carnival. At the end of time I was one hoop ahead and had jawed what I hoped would be the winning point. My opponent had the last turn. He made one hoop and then made a long winning hoop to end the game. I was left with an easy hoop, but too late. I congratulated him, we picked up the balls and clips and as we walked off the referee approached and asked why we had stopped; the scores were tied. And they were; we had both miscalculated. Result: I lost 14-14. The tournament manager declared that rules say that once we have agreed the result and, shaken hands and walked off, that is the result. I pointed out that in these covid times we had not shaken hands, to no avail. Just to rub salt into the wound, the loss triggered my handicap up. Won't happen again.




EASTERN SEABOARD CONTINUES RAIN AND SHINE

LISMORE CROQUET CLUB 90TH ANNIVERSAY

Our heritage listed Club house was officially opened on 21 September 1931. Its history is a little quirky and an interesting one. The plaque on the Clubhouse wall indicates that it was opened by Lady Game, the wife of the then NSW Governor. However, according to media sources, Lady Game was ill at the time and unable to attend. There seems to be no record of the person who took Lady Game's place. So, it has been assumed that the official opening was actually carried out by the State Governor himself, Sir Phillip Game!

What preceded the opening was a great deal of hard work for almost 3 years from November 1928 when a ladies Croquet Club was established by Lismore Council. The rough, virtually untouched land required many hours, days, months and years of work. Eventually, lawns were established, fences and shelters erected and equipment purchased. All this was achieved by what must have been a very determined and stoic group of ladies interested in playing the game of croquet. The aim was to provide an opportunity for affordable healthy exercise which in turn extended one's life span! Back in the day, the Club's colours were black and gold, but from a few old photos it appears that most ladies dressed in calf or ankle length white dresses. Proper play for the ladies was normally side style i.e. standing just behind the ball, holding the mallet on the left or right side of the body and striking the ball.

To mark the milestone anniversary, four days of croquet celebrations will be held this coming September. Club members will compete in special games of Golf Croquet and Ricochet with finals being played on the third day. The special events will culminate in a party atmosphere on the fourth day. That day will be a Friendship day when members

from the other 5 Northern Rivers Croquet Clubs will be invited for a day of fellowship, fun, food, first class hospitality in an all round festive atmosphere. The other 5 Club's in the Northern Rivers region are: Byron Bay, Ballina Cherry Street, Ballina, Alstonville and Casino.

Over the period of the celebrations there will be some prominent local identities involved. The State Member for Lismore, Janelle Saffin and the Federal Member for Page, Kevin Hogan will be presenting awards. Also, the Mayor of Lismore, currently Vanessa Ekins will cut the birthday cake on the final day.

REGISTERING FOR A COMPETITION

All CNSW Club members can enter competitions online, and are asked to update their details, eg their current handicap.

If you are a member of a Croquet NSW affiliated club, you can sign into the website database to visit the **Members Area**, to keep your own details up to date, to register online for CNSW events, and to list coaches and referees with their contact details.

Your club secretary must have entered your email address into the database for you to be able to sign in.

To sign in:

- Select the **Sign In** tab in the top right hand corner of the CNSW web page and do steps 2-5 if you do not yet have a password (or have forgotten it).
- 2. Enter your email address as the Username.
- 3. Press the Sign In button, which will issue the message "Sign In failed".
- 4. Press the Send Password button, which will send your password to your email inbox.
- Open your email to receive the CNSW Website Sign In message containing your password.
- 6. In the Sign In page, enter your email address as the Username, your password as the Password, and press the Sign In button to see:
