### **CLUB HUB PROJECT**

CNSW is happy to advise that on the 12<sup>th</sup> of November we will be launching an Expression of Interest to all clubs in NSW to be a part of the **CLUB HUB PROJECT**.

#### What is the CLUB HUB PROJECT?

CNSW lodged a successful grant application last year that will enable us to collaborate with 6 clubs across the state and fund the delivery of the ACA Academy programs and other coaching, marketing and event management sessions at your club or a club close to yours.

It will also provide clubs with the opportunity to host CNSW events and assist with the cost of doing so.

The CLUB HUBS PROJECT is being funded for the next 2 years, [2022, 2023] providing the successful applicant clubs with a grant of \$5,000 each year to spend toward the designated activities of the Project, namely growing croquet enjoyment, skills, participation and supporting other croquet clubs in your local area.

We will be applying for ongoing funding for Project after 2023.

CNSW is looking for partner clubs to come on this amazing journey, so please consider applying when you receive the EOI information Pack.


### **David Scott**

### Tell us a bit about your Club and what you like best about it?



# What is your Board portfolio and what is your key focus for the next 12 months

# Tell us a bit about your local club and what you like best about it.

Ballina Cherry Street is the largest croquet club in the Northern Rivers Croquet Association with over 80 members who play all forms of croquet from club games to State events.

What I love about our club is that every new member is welcome like they were a member of the family. Our club is one of the social hubs in the area where members can come along have chat with friends, cup of tea, and play croquet.

# **BOOKING TO PLAY AT TEMPE**

Non-CRCC members wishing to play at Tempe should first access the Cooks River CC Court Booking system. This can be done in two ways:

- via the CRCC website (<u>www.cooksrivercroquetclub.com</u>), then click on "Lawn Bookings";
- by going to Court Booking System (croquetbooking.com); or
- by going to www.croquetbooking.com and scrolling up to "Cooks River"

Whatever method is used, you will be presented by a chart showing availability of courts at Tempe today. Sessions which have a solid colour cannot be booked, those with a diagonal with the bottom half coloured can be booked. Sessions are colour coded to indicate what type of play will be taking place. The description at the top of the session describes the session (usually "General play" or "AC or GC Club day", followed by two numbers in square brackets. These numbers indicate the number of players registered for the session and the maximum for the session. You can scroll through the calendar day by day using the arrows next to the "Today" button at the top left, or by clicking on a date in the calendars on the left of the screen.

All CNSW members are welcome to register for any "General play" session, and will also usually be welcome at an AC or GC Club day. Cost is \$6 per day (invoiced monthly)

To register to play, send an email to cooksrivercroquetclub@gmail.com, including your name and the name of your croquet club, and the session at which you would like to play. Also, indicate if this is likely to be a one-off or infrequent visit to Tempe, or if you expect to play at Tempe fairly often. If you are likely to be an infrequent player at Tempe, we will register you for the session requested, and your name will be shown as, for example, "CNSW John Smith". If you expect to play at Tempe fairly often, you will be added to the CRCC court booking system as a user, with a username of, for example, "jsmith" and a name of "CNSW John Smith". You can then access the booking system by clicking the "Login" button at the top right of the screen using either your username or your email address. Once again, you will be invoiced monthly.

### **GRANTS COMING UP**

# **Community Sport Recovery Grants**

The NSW Government has announced a \$25 million funding package for the Sport and Recreation sector as part of the COVID-19 Economic Recovery Strategy.

The Sport and Recreation Recovery and Community Rebuild Package includes:

- Up to \$12.5 million for grants of up to \$1,000 to eligible clubs and associations;
- Up to \$7.8 million to support sporting organisations and peak bodies;
- \$3.1 million to support participation initiatives focused on areas most affected by restrictions, including south-western Sydney and regional NSW;
- Up to \$1 million for grants to support marketing and promotional activities for outdoor and active recreation providers; and
- \$600,000 to support regional talent pathways in the lead up to the Brisbane 2032 Olympics.

Applications open in November.

# **Stronger Community Grants**

We have a new round of funding coming through now through your Local Federal MP. We have the opportunity to fund projects in Clubs between \$2,500 and \$20,000 which include repairs and maintenance, capital projects and capital equipment. This includes things like buying a new mower, fixing the clubhouse roof, disabled access, a renovated bathroom etc.

While the date for Final Submission is 19th January 2022, the application process has a few steps to complete before this date. Each electorate and MP will have a slightly different Process & Timeline specific to your area.

First Step would be for clubs to check with your Local MP, via their website, or have you received a letter outlining their process already? Why not make contact directly by dropping into their Office.

In the first instance you will need to submit an expression of interest (EOI) to your Local Member over coming weeks around your Project Brief and funding required. You may have already mentioned something you need when they last visited. Now is the time to act! The Local Member may have a template or survey, For example, in Newcastle, MP Sharon Claydon has a survey form on her website.

If your EOI is successful, you may be shortlisted and sent a LINK for online application. Key to this will be your relationship with your Local MP.

This type of funding can have a huge impact on your Club's appeal to potential new members and help you with your operations at the club.

#### **Process:**

- Identify Projects that are a priority for your Club.
- Identify timelines & process for your Local MP through their website/Office.
- Gather quotes (if required).

# When you write your EOI

- Please describe your small capital works' project or capital expenditure in 1,000 words or less.
- Briefly describe how this project will contribute to an improvement in local community participation, cohesion, and enhance the vibrancy of our community.
- Grant funding sought (\$).

# GC Referee protocols for the "<u>new</u> COVID-19 normal"



As competitive play resumes, referees will continue to be there as a supportive resource for players. For the protection of everyone involved, some additional protocols will be implemented by referees.

- Referees will have Eyes and Mind on the play but Hands *OFF!*As far as possible, they will avoid any contact with equipment while play is in progress.
- \* Referees will remain accessible but seek to minimise their presence on the lawn and are very likely to wear a mask whenever they are active on the lawn.

If the need arises, players will be expected to move balls and/or clips as directed by the referee. In addition, players should carry markers with them at all times and be ready to mark any ball they own if requested by the other game in double-banked play.

# **ADVANTAGE GC HANDICAPPING**

# An invitation to Associations, clubs and players to try a new form of handicap GC

The World Croquet Federation has written to all Clubs inviting them to trial a new form of handicap play in Golf Croquet games. Croquet NSW invites interested Clubs to try the system at Club or regional tournaments to see how it works. The current form of handicap GC uses extra strokes and is played mainly in Australia, England, and New Zealand and almost nowhere else. It is not generally regarded as the optimal way of allowing players of different abilities to compete on equal terms.

In 2020, the WCF Management Committee ("MC") obtained details from the Croquet Association of Ireland of a form of handicap GC that it had used successfully in recent years. This did not use extra strokes but instead gave the weaker player an advantage in the form of a certain number of hoops. Unlike the current form of handicap GC, this version did not require different tactics from the level game and it was believed that this made it easier for new and improving players to develop.

The MC then established a Working Group with representatives from Australia, England, Latvia, Uruguay and USA with the task of coming up with a statistically sound and yet simple-to-use algorithm which would give both players a 50/50 chance of winning a game through an adjustment of the number of hoops that needed to be scored by one or both players to win a game.

The Working Group has developed a form of GC which has been named "Advantage GC" which is described in the three documents below, namely (1) an introduction and outline of the game, (2) a table of starting scores for a GC handicap game which depend on either the handicaps or DG rades of the players and (3) the mathematical basis of the algorithm that generates the starting scores.

The MC believes that Advantage GC has an excellent chance of gaining general support amongst the playing community if they have the opportunity to try it out. An official trial will take place during the English CA's Southern Federation 2021 League season. However, players around the world are warmly encouraged to read at least the first two documents and try Advantage GC in their clubs and, if possible, in some handicap tournaments during 2021.

All participants in trials of Advantage GC are requested to send feedback to the MC about their impressions and observations and also provide game results which show the handicaps and/or DGrades of the players. The MC would like to receive as much feedback and results data as possible by the end of 2021. A dedicated email address has been set up for this purpose – advantagegc@worldcroquet.org

### STATE HANDICAPPER

Croquet NSW is looking for a person(s) to undertake the role of State Handicapper.

The State Handicapper shall administer the Australian Handicapping Regulations for Croquet NSW. They will consider and impart to all clubs additional supplementary advice or guidelines as they are received from time to time from the ACA Handicapping Committee.

The Officer should ideally:

- Be familiar with Association Croquet, Golf Croquet and Ricochet
- Have a broad knowledge of play and competition throughout the State
- Be available for advice on Handicapping for Clubs across the State
- Provide information and training where appropriate in the area of assigning, changing and determining player handicaps.

It may be possible to appoint a different person for the different codes. Gareth Denyer (current handicapper) is happy to be a mentor for the position.
