# CALLING FOR ENTRIES TO CNSW'S 2023 CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS EVENTS FOR ASSOCIATION AND GOLF CROQUET

The AC and GC Champion of Champions events have been fixtures of the annual CNSW events calendar for many years. CNSW records show that the AC Champion of Champions event commenced in 1958 and the GC Champion of Champions event commenced in 2012.

The eligibility criterion for the "Champion of Champions" events is that only "club champions" for the relevant year for each affiliated CNSW club can enter the events. In 2023, the AC Champion of Champions event will be held at Tempe on 10-12 November, and the GC Champion of Champions event will be held at Tempe on

#### 1-3 December.

Over the last 5-10 years, the number of entries for both these events has fallen to extremely low levels, with both events having been cancelled at least once due to a lack of entries in this period. The Tournament Committee would like to get 15-20 entries for each event in 2023 to provide for a full draw of round robin games and potentially semi-finals and a final.

We strongly encourage all winners of club "open" AC and GC club champion competitions during the 2023 calendar year to consider entering the equivalent CNSW Champion of Champions event at the end of 2023. The events are a great opportunity to test your skills against players from a variety of clubs and playing backgrounds, many of whom you may not have played previously.

Should numbers for the 2023 events remain at low levels, the Tournament Committee will be reviewing the entry criteria and overall viability of continuing to include these events on the CNSW events calendar in the years ahead. Stephen Richards

#### FROM THE BOARD

The following issues are current Board priorities:

# Membership Management Platform

CNSW is identifying a suitable provider of a Membership Management database to provide easy access to registration and members information for all clubs. Two candidates are being assessed with a decision soon to be made.

This new platform will be key to a CNSW branding and marketing strategy as it will enable better targeting of clubs, sponsors and potential members. Rik Mills (CNSW Secretary) will contribute to the National Database Working Group to identify State's needs.

#### **CNSW Operation Planning**

Focus is on participation and membership growth including increase in the membership by 10% by end of 2024. This is to be achieved by better marketing of croquet and assisting clubs in marketing to their local areas. It is expected that Croquet Australia will release their new logo and branding strategy shortly, which Croquet NSW will consider in its marketing strategy.

# **Facility Management**

The Tempe facility and the relationship with Cooks River Croquet Club (CRCC) was discussed. A lawn use agreement between CNSW and CRCC is in the pipeline and is expected to be in place soon. A key initiative proposed by CRCC is to obtain grants to install lighting at Tempe. This will enable the heavy use of this facility (arising for CNSW tournament schedule and CRCC activities) to be extended over the day and also assist attracting working people to attend Come and Try and to play after work during the week.

#### **NSW GC State Team Selection**

Selection of the members of the NSW GC State Team to travel to Perth in September 2023 for the Interstate Shield (ISS) is being finalised. Five women and five men make up the Team, plus reserves.

#### **Tournament Entries**

It is peak tournament time and peak time for our Treasurer processing tournament entries. You can make his life easier by:

- 1. Paying before you play
- 2. Identifying who is the entrant if you are paying for somebody else
- 3. Including the tournament code in the payment description line. This is the line that gets downloaded from the bank when payments are processed

There is no need to send a confirming receipt. Payments are received immediately if you use a bank transfer. Each tournament has a three-letter code e.g. G3S (GC Division 3 singles) which is used to reconcile tournament entries and payments. Words such as "GC Ballina" just create extra work.

If you withdraw, then please send an email with your bank details to <a href="mailto:treasurer@croquet-nsw.org">treasurer@croquet-nsw.org</a> so a refund can be processed. It is easier to refund rather than allocate to another tournament. Refunds usually take a week or two. And of course, enjoy your game!

#### **GC PENNANTS REPORT - JUNE 2023**

#### **Division 3**

Over 78 days, 31 teams divided into 5 zones completed 102 pennant contests. That's 306 Bo3 matches and around 800 games of GC! And then there were the Finals - 5 teams playing 10 more contests (30 matches and around 75 games) over 2.5 days at Toronto Club.

And the winners were the Wollongong team by a margin of just 1 match! Runners-Up were the Nelson Bay Birubi team who in turn finished just 1 match ahead of the Marrickville team! Congratulations also to the Canberra and Chatswood teams for reaching the Finals.

#### **Division 2**

Over 92 days, 24 teams in 4 zones completed 61 contests (183 Bo3 matches and around 450 games!) The Finals involved 4 teams playing 6 more contests over 1.5 days at Canberra Club.

After a nailbiting finish where the winner of Division 2 would be determined by the very last game being played, the Canberra team came out on top with the Marrickville team as Runners-Up.

Congratulations also to the Mosman White and Nelson Bay Kingsley teams for reaching the Finals.

# JUNIORS IN CROQUET

Croquet New South Wales is encouraging the participation of junior players across the State. It is also committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of Children in croquet.

Croquet NSW has signed up to the Sport Integrity Framework through the Australian Croquet Association, which includes the Child Safeguarding Policy. We remind members that all Clubs are bound by these policies to ensure that junior players (especially those under 18years old) are able to participate in a safe, positive and enjoyable environment. All coaches are required to have up to date Working With Children Checks (WWCC)/Working With Vulnerable People in the ACT (WWVP). Please ensure you advise the Coaching Co-ordinator to keep your WWCC/WWVP accreditation up to date. You are not able to undertake coaching without this accreditation, and certainly not coaching juniors. Clubs which have junior members need to ensure they have procedures and protocols outlining how the Child Safeguarding Policy is implemented at your Club.

Chatswood Club has drafted a Policy for their Club which provides a useful model. This is available on the CNSW website. This includes supervision of children, communication protocols, reporting requirements, and the responsibility of juniors. Croquet NSW is working with the ACA and Sport Integrity Australia to provide further guidance and training to assist Clubs to understand and implement Child Safe Practices.

Sport Integrity Australia offers online learning for club members. It also has a very practical brochure listing Child Safe Practices: Dos and Don'ts.

The Office of the Children's Guardian has released a free Child Safe Self-Assessment for child-related organisations to assess how well they are implementing the 10 Child Safe Standards. The introduction to the Child Safeguarding Policy is worth reading and an extract appears below:

- The Australian Croquet Association has a zero-tolerance policy to child abuse and neglect in any form.
- The Australian Croquet Association is committed to ensuring that everyone involved in Croquet and Gateball is educated and informed of their responsibilities to protect and look after Children.
- All Children have the right to feel safe and protected from all forms of abuse, harm, and neglect. Children have the right to take part in sport in a safe, positive, and enjoyable environment. This Policy is part of the Australian Croquet Association's proactive and preventative approach to upholding its commitment to the safety, wellbeing, participation and empowerment of all Children who access Croquet and/or Gateball.
- This Policy sets out the standards of behaviour expected of those involved in croquet and the behaviours that are not acceptable ('Prohibited Conduct').
- This Policy imposes obligations on the Australian Croquet Association and Croquet and Gateball Organisations in relation to responding to allegations of Prohibited Conduct, including by reporting suspected Child Abuse to the appropriate authorities, and to implementing a commitment to child safety and child-safe practices, including recruitment and screening of staff and volunteers.

## **CNSW AFFILIATION FEES**

Many of you found last month's article on the new affiliation fee procedures confusing – well we did too! After a lot of feedback from the States, Croquet Australia has listened and introduced proportional fees for new members. This means that CNSW can go back to something we all understand – half yearly billing of affiliation fees.

The next invoice clubs will receive will be \$27 (\$16 for ACA and \$11 for CNSW) based on 30 September data. ACA is reviewing its 2024 fees and it is likely there will be some increase (\$1 to \$2 per half year), but CNSW will not be increasing its affiliation fee of \$11 per half year.

- Secures State Grants which are used to support player development and overall sport development. Recent
  examples have included \$1,000 grants for Covid support in 2020 and 2022 as well as grants to establish Club
  Hubs
- Hosts nationally recognised events for elite players to ensure player excellence and selection
- Runs State-wide competitions for players at all levels to support improved standards of play
- Maintains the Tempe Croquet Centre to provide an accessible central venue for State competitions
- Supports clubs to host CNSW events to maximise participation and foster tournament management expertise

We use Sports Grants to cover: Hub programs and Support for our facilities at Tempe. We have other sources of income which we also use to fund our activities including our facilities. Our tournaments cover their costs through tournament entry fees. Our affiliation fees are much lower than other States and croquet itself is a relatively low-cost sport. With participants converging on the lawns from throughout the region, as well as Sydney, Nowra, Blue Mountains, Queanbeyan and Belmont (Victoria) to name a handful, Ron Hill Oval was a hive of activity again, and competition was fierce – but fun – over the three-day croquet golf tournament, which attracted 32 players.

Toronto Croquet Club founder Pam Drurie officially opened the Games, with singles and doubles being contested, according to handicaps, in a round-robin format.

In the doubles, Nowra pair Doug Cornish and Brian Mitchell secured Block A, Pelican's Denise Eckersley teamed up with Woolgoolga's Susan Bryan to claim Block B, while Lyn and Jim Cook (Blue Mountains) prevailed in Block C. There are also 2 spots up for grabs in the Bronze Medal to choose the best NSW player to compete against the other State Champions.

Gareth Denyer won the mens block with 9 wins and 1 loss net hoops of +28. Hunter McPherson was runner up with 6 wins and 4 losses net hoops of +2

In the Women's block, Kate McLoughlin was the winner with 11 wins and 3 losses with net hoops of +23. Runner up was Gerda Lambeck with 9 wins and 5 losses with net hoops of +11. Both Gareth and Kate have been invited to constest the CNSW ACA GC Bronze Medal 23-25 June.



# Manly Seabreeze (GC) 9-12 May


